When I was 18 years old, a judge sentenced me to 67 years to life for murder. I'd never finished junior high school, but I decided to write my way out of prison. 21 years later, I did just that. In the process, I became an expert on media and communications, advocacy in the criminal legal system, prison abolition, transformative justice, and strategies for racial justice What I accomplished has been described as a miracle. It was actually the result of simple principles that are accessible to everyone. Using these principles, I offer practical tools and analytical frameworks to help professionals, organizations, and artists change policy, develop transformative programs, and shift culture.
